Extension

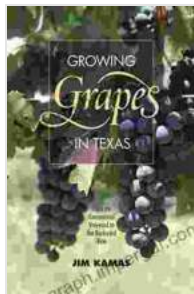
The Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension viticulture and enology program provides a variety of extension services to grape growers and winemakers. These services include:

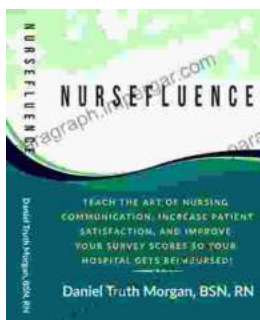

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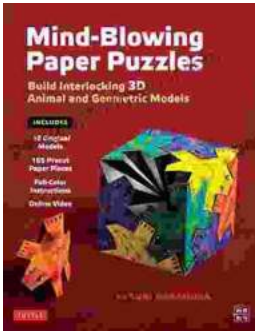
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
